Jeremiah 29:1, 4-7



Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David-that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him;

if we endure, we will also reign with him;

if we deny him, he will also deny us;

if we are faithless, he remains faithful-

for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.





Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us. **Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia.**




Roots & Wings: Stewardship 2023

About the Music This Week

The **prelude** is a setting of the Dakota tune *Lacquiparle*, named after a Santee Dakota village on the Minnesota River ("Lac qui parle" translates to "lake that speaks"). The missionary fur trader Joseph Renville took from a Dakota air, and third-generation Dakota pastor Philip Frazier translated the text into English which is included in many denominations' hymnals as "Many and Great." The **postlude** by Ernest Bloch –a Swiss composer whose music often reflected his Jewish heritage – is offered as an acknowledgement of this past week's observance of Yom Kippur: the holiest day within the Jewish faith.
