



The Lessons

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Acts 1-:34-43

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ--he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the

dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."



John 20:1-18

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended

to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.



Lift up your hearts.


We lift them to the Lord.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. About This Week's Music

This morning's **choral anthems** span nearly four hundred years. The dramatic Easter Sequence, "Victimae Paschali Laudes" for double chorus and organ, was composed by Victoria in 1600. This arrangement takes the second choir and transforms it into a brass quartet. Victoria was a prolific composer, a contemporary (and likely student) of Palestrina who wrote no secular music in his lifetime. C.V. Stanford composed "Ye Choirs of New Jerusalem" in December of 1910, using a 19th-century translation of the medieval Chorus novae Ierusalem, attributed to Fulbert of Chartres. "There is a Redeemer" is a setting of the 1982 hymn by Melody Green, found now in over thirty hymnals across a dozen countries, including the 2000 publication "Complete Anglican Hymns Old and New." Dubbed the "Dean of Black Women Composers," Undine Smith Moore was the first student from an HBCU (Fisk) to receive a scholarship from the Juilliard School, and continued her training in New York City during the Harlem Renaissance. Her catalogue includes over one hundred works, of which only twenty-five were published in her lifetime, including her arrangement of the Negro Spiritual "I Believe This is Jesus." The **prelude and postlude** are by French composer Théodore Dubois, who despite pursuing a career as an opera composer, is best known for his organ and choral music (The Seven Last Words of Christ is a staple of choral repertoire during Holy Week). "Grand Chær" is heard this morning in a setting for organ and brass quartet, and "Toccata" is a neo-classical bop. Both come from a set of 1889 organ works he crafted while serving as the director of the Paris Conservatory, a position he famously resigned after a faculty scandal which sought to suppress the success of a radical student named Maurice Ravel.
