It is a credit to you if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, what credit is that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps.

"He committed no sin,

John 10:1-10

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."





About This Week's Music

Surprisingly little is known of the composer Hedwige Chrétien, the composer of this morning's **prelude.** She was accepted to the Paris Conservatory in 1874, where she won first prize in harmony, counterpoint and fugue. By 1889, she was appointed professor at the same institution. Later in her life, she wrote extensively for the organ, publishing the anthology "Harmonies Religieuses," where this prelude is found. Canadian Healey Willan was one of the most prolific composers of his generation, writing operas, symphonies, chamber music, and the largest body of his output: music for the church. The **offertory anthem** comes from his 1924 set "Six Motets," and sets the text of St. Thomas Aguinas. The **postlude** is by Gregory Hamilton, who studied at the Royal College of Music in London before earning a doctorate in Sacred Music from the University of Michigan. He was faculty and Director of Sacred Music at Holy Trinity Seminary (University of Dallas) before assuming his current position as Director of Music at St. Joseph Church (Basilica) in Macon, Georgia.
