A reading from Paul's letter to the Hebrews.


Hebrews 1:1-4

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the Creator of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

About This Week's Music

Today's **prelude** is a sonata by the German composer Carl Reinecke which blends themes from Bach's "Christmas" Oratorio" and Handel's "Messiah" with traditional Christmas carols Silent Night, Holy Night, Vom Himmel hoch and O du frohliche. It was originally a work for solo piano, and was later adapted by the famed violinst and composer Hans Sitt, into the arrangement heard this morning. The **offertory** comes from Part 1 of Handel's "Messiah," which is often referred to as the "Christmas" portion of the three-part work. The hymn "Personent hodie" was first published in 1582, although the melody can be traced back to a 1360 manuscript. Rebecca Groom te Velde crafted the postlude on this hymn, whose original Latin text translates to "On this day earth shall ring / with the song children sing / to the Lord, Christ our King / born on earth to save us."
